PROPERTY REPORT

Manse

Cement ingoes and raised brickwork still need attention.

The external wall which showed signs of dampness has been attended to in the ground floor bedroom.

The manse inspection will be carried out in January by John Kerr of Corrie Church and myself.

Hall

The hall floor badminton lines have been repainted, and the hall floor has been given a coat of varnish. A big thank you to the volunteers who helped. All electrics are up to required standards. Two overhead heaters have been renewed together with a water heater and heated towel rail. The ladies' toilet was blocked yet again **See notice in toilet.** The gutters and downpipes have had their annual clean. New taps and a water heater have been fitted in the kitchen.

Church

The electrics are now in line with the current regulations The standards to the lighting are also in place to hold the lamps to illuminate lead glazed windows to the rear of the church. Our grateful thanks go to John Corbett for supplying the necessary poles. A replacement spotlight was also fitted. The timber lining was stripped and suitably replaced in the front vestibule. Care should be taken when mopping the vestibule floor. Thanks go to Archie Hamilton and Brian Boal for fitting the rail for the Wall Hanging and to Willie Innes for making and fitting the shelf for the audio equipment

A quinquennial visit was made on 28/12/10 to inspect our properties, Manse, Hall and surrounding feus. A report will follow in due course from the surveying company CRPG. N C

This month sees us bid farewell to Sharon MacLeod on completion of her second six month attachment to our congregations. She previously spent six months with us from the beginning of 2010. The first period, whilst she went through the inquiry process to see if she felt called to the Readership, was less formal. This second period however, has been for her a time of assessment in order to see if she is suitable to go forward to begin formal training. Besides leading worship regularly, Sharon has also had to keep a daily journal, wade through prescribed reading and endure being assessed by a psychologist on two occasions. She must now go before a panel of four assessors for a final interview at the end of this month. At least two of the faces on that panel will be well known to her, myself as her Supervising Minister and Gillean MacLean, as her Presbytery Representative. None the less with two others present, both appointed by 121, it will be a daunting process and I'm sure on your behalf you would like me here in print to wish her well on the big day (22nd February). Many of you I know, have been impressed by her competency in our various pulpits over the past months.

If successful, Sharon will then have to undergo a possible further three years of training, before being set apart as a Reader in the Church of Scotland. Of course we already have Liz Clarke from the linkage currently undergoing that training. Liz has just completed the first of three six month periods of distance learning academic study with the Highland Theological College, Dingwall, and is soon to commence the first of another three attachments to local congregations. Such are the rigours endured by those who put themselves forward for Readership. The Church of Scotland has always set very high standards for those who regularly preach in her pulpits. And rightly so, for preaching is a high calling and one that is so very important to the worship lives of our congregations. We should be grateful that there are people like Sharon and Liz willing to undergo such a strict training regime, whilst at the same time holding down demanding day jobs, in both their cases, as teachers at Arran High School. With the further reduction of some 200 ministers proposed in the near future by the powers that be, that is just as well. We are most certainly going to need them.

We should be very grateful too, to those in our worship teams, who also

from time to time lead worship during those Sundays, Jean or myself are on holiday. On the last occasion the Shiskine worship team, led by Helen Knight and Helen Kerr, covered the services at Brodick and Corrie in Jean's absence, I was the only minister left on the island, due to both Elizabeth Watson and Gillean MacLean also being away on holiday. With Ian MacLeod covering for Gillean at Lamlash and the other retired ministers unavailable, but for us having well trained and experienced worship teams in place, both here in North Arran and at Whiting Bay, we would have had to bring over pulpit supply from the mainland, at no inconsiderable cost.

Our worship teams are an integral part of our worship lives at Brodick, Corrie, Lochranza, Pirmill and Shiskine and will, I have no doubt, continue to be more needed than ever in the future, especially in light of the fact, that the only retired minister who feels capable of undertaking the marathon of the three services down the west coast from Lochranza to Shiskine on a Sunday, is Rev Dr Ian MacLeod. Long may he continue to enjoy the fitness and health to undertake this task. However, many of the members of our worship teams are also retired and they too find this extremely arduous. So if there are any out there who might be interested in joining the Brodick team, you would be welcomed with open arms. And who knows, once you try it, you might even find yourself called to the Readership, just like Sharon and Liz, who but for the experience of becoming involved in the worship life of their own congregations, would never have thought themselves capable of such an undertaking.

If anyone is tempted, please let me know. And rest assured no one will be expected to do anything out of their comfort zones. Even if you only feel capable of reading the lessons, your contribution would be gratefully received. We also have in place in each of our churches, the newest edition of *Common Order*. This excellent official worship resource contains full sets of prayers for all occasions, and is there to be used in an emergency should Jean or myself be unable to get to worship. Anyone with an ability to read well in public, could also read these prayers for public worship. As it says in the preface 'This is a **common** book, because it belongs to all the people of God. In the reformed understanding, worship is not the right of an ordained caste, but is the duty, joy, and prerogative of all believers.'

BLYTHSWOOD APPEAL 2010

Against all odds, approximately 200 shoe boxes left Arran this year for the annual shoe box appeal for Blythswood Care. Not only an excellent number of boxes but also a record amount of money of about £300 was donated. This money provides financial help towards transport costs when the boxes are taken abroad for Christmas delivery. The team at Brodick Church worked in conjunction with many of the island congregations, although Brodick remains the main contact and centre for Arran. Without the assistance of the other churches and Arran Deliveries this mission would have been impossible.

Many thanks, particularly to Tony Morrow of Arran Deliveries, who, every year, transports the boxes free of charge to the mainland depot and to all who donated boxes or helped in any way.

The 2010 Blythswood Appeal was not only a great success but a rewarding experience.

CONGREGATIONAL BOARD

On Saturday 6th November a joint meeting of the five churches in the linkage was held in Brodick Church. This was followed by a very successful social gathering of all congregations in Brodick Golf Club. Many of the items discussed applied to all Church Boards but the following were of special interest to Brodick.

The five church boards decided to purchase a Digi Box, this only to be used when an organist is unavailable or for small services for example at Montrose House or similar gatherings.

A total of £10000 (£4000 being Brodick's contribution) has been paid to the Church of Scotland in Edinburgh, and been acknowledged by the Financial Convenor of Ardrossan Presbytery. This expenditure is necessary to lower the deficit as we are five aid receiving congregations.

Nobody who attended services during Advent could have failed to admire the Sanctuary's beautiful, festive decorations. Many people were involved in this, organising, erecting and decorating the tree, and making the Church so lovely with flowers and candles. To all our grateful thanks and my best wishes to everyone for a Happy, Peaceful New Year.

WORSHIP (2) - PRAYER

'Prayer is always relevant. Whatever is a concern in the heart of man or woman is a concern in the heart of God. Remember: If it's big enough to worry about, it's big enough to pray about.' (Ronald Dunn)

Prayer is part of our worship, whether corporate, when we meet on a Sunday, or individual.

The life of a Christian is spent following Jesus Christ. Therefore, because Jesus **prayed**, prayer is a life giving part of our following Him.

Many people think **prayer** is complex and difficult, it is not. In prayer we are speaking to our Father. A Father who loves us and wants to hear what we have to say to Him. In our Worship, in our prayers we tell God how much we love him and adore him, we give Him thanks and we confess our sins. We are also encouraged to pray by the many invitations to prayer which we find in the Bible - God's Word to us.

'1 John 5: 14. This is the confidence we have in approaching God: that if we ask anything according to his will he hears us.'

Most often when we speak to our Father in prayer He wants to hear about our needs and concerns. What is it that you are worrying about just now? What is upsetting you today? I repeat again what Ronald Dunn says: If it's big enough to worry about, it's big enough to pray about.

In our congregation when we meet on a Sunday to Worship we pray together. When we gather for prayer we bring before God many different situations we are aware of. Prayer is offered for our World, Nation, Island, our Community, Schools, Health professionals, those who are ill and so much more. We believe that in all these situations God wants us to pray and wants to answer us when we pray.

It is good to pray on our own and we are commanded to pray by ourselves, and we have times for silent prayer in our service too but we learn to pray when we pray together. As we share with one another, as we hear whoever is leading us in prayer pray with us, as we see God answering prayers which have been offered to Him, so our confidence and trust in prayer and in the God who answers prayer grows. You will be better able to pray alone if you have learned to pray with others and from others. Many of the prayers of the saints of the past have been written down and we can learn from them.

We believe that prayer is a gift of God. Through prayer God opens the floodgates of heaven and pours out His blessing upon His people.

'2 Chronicles 7:14 If my people, who are called by my name, will humble themselves and pray and seek my face, then I hear from heaven.'

Prayer is part of our worship. If you would like more information on prayer or books on prayer, please ask.

WE ARE THE SURVIVORS

This is an article for those born before 1940

We were born before , penicillin, frozen foods, contact lenses, videos, Xerox frisbees, and freebies We lived before the radar, credit cards, split atoms , laser beams and ballpoint pens; before dishwashers, tumble driers, electric blankets air conditioners, drip-dry clothes, and before man walked on the moon.

We got married first and then lived together. We thought 'fast food' was what you ate during Lent. A 'Big Mac' was an oversized raincoat, and crumpet was what we had for tea. We existed before house-husbands, computer dating, dual careers; when a meaningful relationship meant getting along with your cousins and sheltered accommodation was where you waited for a bus.

We were before day care centres, group homes and disposable nappies. We had never heard of FM radio, tape decks, electric typewriters, artificial hearts, word processors, yoghurt and young men wearing earrings. For us 'time sharing' meant togetherness, a chip was a piece of wood or a fried potato, hardware meant nuts and bolts and software wasn't a word.

Before 1940 , the term 'making out' referred to how you did in your exams; a stud was something that fastened a collar to a shirt; and 'going all the way' meant staying on a double decker bus until you reached your destination.

Pizzas, McDonalds and instant coffee were unheard of. In our day smoking was fashionable, grass was mowed, coke was kept in the coal cellar , a joint was a piece of meat you had on a Sunday and pot was something you cooked it in. Rock music was a grandmother's lullaby. El Dorado was an ice cream.

We who were born before 1940 must be a hardy bunch when you think of the ways in which the world has changed and the adjustments we have had to make. No wonder we are so confused and there is a generation gap!

But, by the grace of God we have survived – Hallelujah!

We all know that in today's difficult financial situation, costs continue to rise, and we are grateful to those members who have recently reviewed, and, as a result increased, their regular giving.

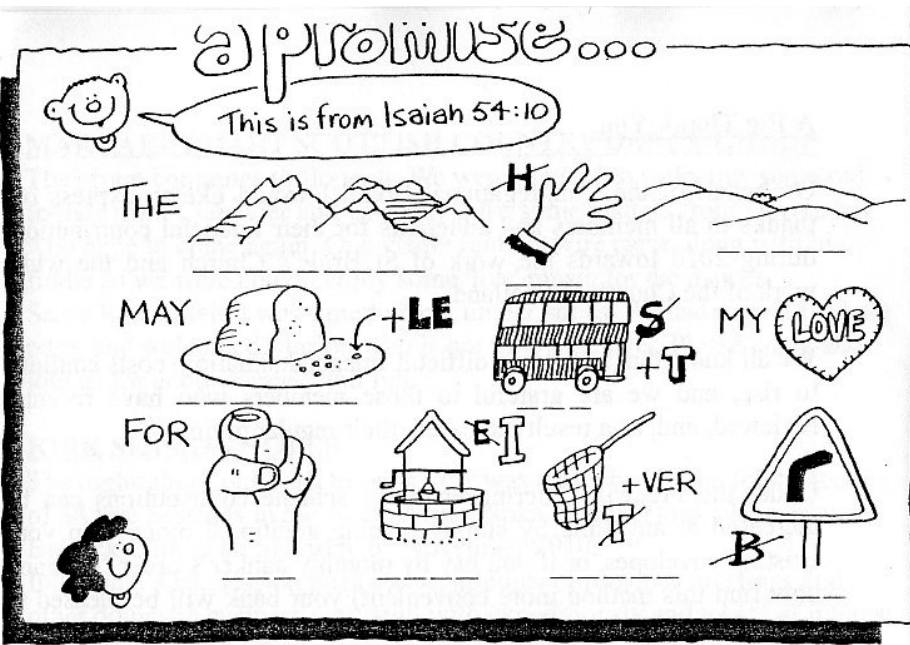

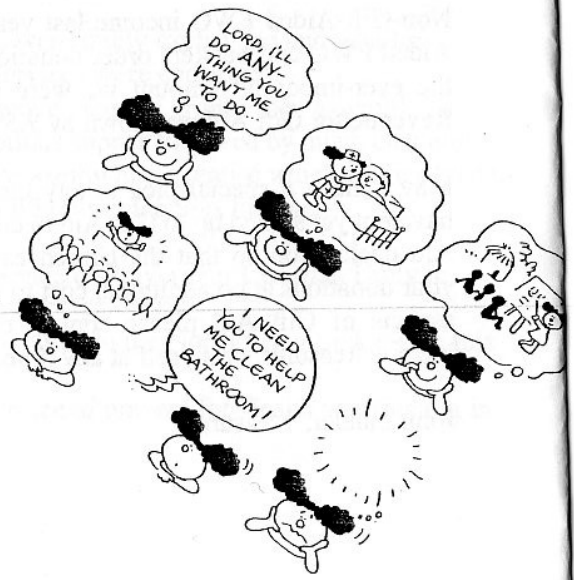
